

World Economic Forum Announces Young Global Leaders 2011 (Latin America)

- 190 young leaders from 65 countries are honoured for their outstanding leadership, professional accomplishments and commitment to society
- Of these selected young leaders, 16 are from Latin America
- Young Global Leaders are selected from a variety of sectors such as business, government, academia, media, non-profit organizations and arts and culture from all regions of the world
- Young Global Leaders engage in task forces that address specific challenges of public interest with the objective of shaping a better future

Geneva, Switzerland – The World Economic Forum has announced its Young Global Leaders (YGLs) for 2011. The honour, bestowed each year by the Forum, recognizes and acknowledges up to 200 outstanding young leaders from around the world for their professional accomplishments, commitment to society and potential to contribute to shaping the future of the world.

For 2011, the Forum has selected [190 Young Global Leaders](#) from 65 countries and all stakeholders of society (business, civil society, social entrepreneurs, politics and government, arts and culture, and opinion and media). The new class represents all regions: East Asia (50), South Asia (18), Europe (42), Middle East and North Africa (13), sub-Saharan Africa (14), North America (37) and Latin America (16). This year's selection has more gender parity than ever, with 44% women.

"The challenges faced by the next generation of leaders are more daunting and intractable than ever and cannot be mastered with the current set of strategies, institutions, standards and attitudes. To address these challenges in a meaningful and sustainable way requires fresh thinking, multistakeholder engagement and dynamic new ways of collaborating to develop innovative solutions that are truly global. Recognizing this need, in 2004, I created the foremost platform for young leaders to engage in global affairs to shape a more positive, peaceful and prosperous society. Within the World Economic Forum community, the Young Global Leaders represent the voice for the future and the hopes of the next generation. I am particularly proud of this year's honourees who make up the most diverse class of YGLs ever," said Klaus Schwab, Founder and Executive Chairman of the World Economic Forum.

Drawn from a pool of almost 5,000 candidates, the Young Global Leaders 2011 were chosen by a selection committee, chaired by H.M. Queen Rania Al Abdullah of the Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan.

The Young Global Leaders 2011 reflect different kinds of leadership in different parts of the world and different parts of society. Those from Latin America include Wenceslao Casares, Co-Chief Executive Officer, Bling Nation (from Argentina but based in the United States); Juan Carlos Pinzón Bueno, Chief of Staff, Office of the President of Colombia; Ricardo Terán, Co-Founder and Managing Partner, Agora Partnerships, (from Nicaragua); Yara Argueta, Chief Operating Officer, Grupo Solid (from Guatemala); Wolff Klabin, Director, ORT Brazil (from Brazil); Eric Parrado, Professor, University Adolfo Ibañez (from Chile); and Carlos Mota, Columnist and Anchor, Milenio (from Mexico), among others.

"A YGL nomination comes not only as a recognition of our previous efforts. It is indeed received as a critical commitment to enrol ourselves in the paramount endeavour of building the fundamentals for a prosperous world,"

says Carlos Mota of Milenio, Mexico. Another recently selected YGL, Ricardo Terán, of Agora Partnerships, Nicaragua, explains his reaction to becoming a Young Global Leader as follows: "Being nominated as a YGL is truly a huge honour, and it fulfils a long-time goal I have had: to be able to sit around the table with the world's top changemakers to listen and learn about how positive change happens and be able to bring the best of that knowledge back to Nicaragua and Central America. I hope that in process, I can also contribute with ideas and my own experiences to help make a dent in the universe. "

The 2011 honourees will become part of the broader Forum of Young Global Leaders community that currently comprises 668 outstanding individuals. The YGLs convene at an annual summit which this year will be held in Dalian, People ' s Republic of China, on 12-16 September 2011. Young Global Leaders are actively engaged in the community, integrating into events organized by the World Economic Forum, holding events of their own as well as launching and leading a number of innovative initiatives and impactful task forces. These activities enable YGLs to learn from each other, and with each other, to build knowledge and engender a better understanding of global challenges and trends, risks and opportunities, as well as to further enhance their unique role as leaders within their own organizations, the World Economic Forum and the broader global community.

The YGL community helps its members make the transition (as one YGL told me) ' from success to significance ' and strives to move from a collection of successful individuals to a community of collective impact. YGLs hold each other accountable to a higher standard of global leadership in their professional and personal lives, so it really is about making the world a better place, one leader at a time," said David Aikman, Head of The Forum of Young Global Leaders.
